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Letter from Sister Mary Cecilia

Whoever said that schools are a better place without students was never at St. Teresa's.

Never would I have envisioned spending the last quarter of our school year in a distance education environment. Never. It just would never have crossed my mind. Yet, that is our current reality. Students learning at home; teachers teaching from home; the school is closed to students & parents; and we have begun to rely on cell phones, laptops, and the internet to assist us, even more than usual, in the education of the children entrusted to our care.

Heritage School




Junior High Beyond Words
