# Catechesis of the Good Shepherd

The afternoon pre-kindergarten, kindergarten classes, and the second grade classes attend Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS) weekly during the school day. Originally started in Rome over 60 years ago, CGS is based on the belief that the child is already in relationship with God. The room prepared for the children is called the atrium. Each week, the children hear a presentation from the Bible or Liturgy expressed in ways that lead to silence and study, contemplation, and prayer. Each presentation is accompanied by physical materials to help the child further contemplate. The children are given time to work



with the materials of their choice.

The beginning of the year focused on presentations of Practical Life - parents may have heard their child discussing pouring beans or water, grating soap, or polishing metal. These activities allow the child to calm and focus. This ability is essential for the child to develop a capacity for prayer and contemplation. The disposition learned in these activities will aid in the future scriptural and liturgical presentations. Introductory liturgical works for the pre-K and Kindergarten included preparing a child-size altar, and learning about vestments in the four main liturgical colors, and the gesture of Epiclesis. These works are accompanied by songs that engage the children and were often reported to be sung spontaneously during the rest of the school day and at home!

During Advent, the children reflect on waiting, as people did for hundreds of years before Christ, and heard the words of the prophets. They wondered who the promised Savior would be. The children listen and wonder about the events of the Annunciation and Visitation. During Christmastime, the children wonder about the birth of Christ and adoration of the shepherds, the visit of the Magi, the Presentation

in the Temple, and the Flight to Egypt. During Ordinary Time, the parables of the Kingdom of God – the Mustard Seed, the Precious Pearl, and the Leaven are presented. For the younger children, the parables of the Good Shepherd are central. Most importantly, the work of the atrium aids in the child learning the love God has for him or her - and growing in his or her relationship with Him.



Early in the fall, a rambunctious kindergartener told Sister Mary Chiara a "toilet" themed joke at recess. After a couple of experiences of CGS, he approached Sister and wanted to sing songs from the atrium to her. We pray for Christ to work more transformations in the hearts of these little ones through their time in the atrium and in Catechesis of the Good Shepherd.

#### Illuminated Gospels

Books are everywhere. They are relatively inexpensive and we take them for granted. That, of course, wasn't always the case. In the library, the 5<sup>th</sup> grade explored how books used to be made. Books were expensive and, for most people, rare. In ancient times, from roughly 3000 BC to the 4<sup>th</sup> century AD, papyrus was the predominate paper. It was often put together in scrolls and the scribes who copied works of literature or philosophy—or the bible -- had to be skilled. For our exploration, we created "papyrus" from paper lunch sacks and a glue/water mix (due to a fortuitous mix-up in supplies, the 5<sup>th</sup> grade ended up with a lot of glue). After the "papyrus" dried, the kids used markers to copy a portion of Luke's gospel and to



create images on the paper in order to create illuminated pages. It was a delight to see the 5<sup>th</sup> graders at work. They practiced and planned what they were going to make and did an excellent job!
